

Fox Hollies Community Association is a registered charity based at Fox Hollies Forum on Greenwood Avenue. On 31st January it celebrated 30 years of Community Work. Established in 1989 by a small group of Residents in the Fox Hollies area of Acocks Green it has raised hundreds of thousands of pounds for the less fortunate members of our community. Their annual income has now grown to £250,000 and they take on the full costs of running the centre employing 10 workers. Their work ranges from Pre-school Playgroup, social activities for older people, to lunch clubs for housebound and disabled groups. They also undertake a number of community development projects, working in conjunction with other groups to develop more provision especially for young people 11 to 18 years of age.

Their latest venture **Carpet Bowling** takes place on Monday afternoons, 1pm-3pm. Refreshments are provided and it is just £2. Why not go along and meet new people and have some fun! Recently they have also been going through the archives and posting photos and articles on the Facebook page highlighting the Association's work since 1989. 




Village in Bloom 2019

Here are a taste of some of their work and plans.

Keep the Green Clean!

This year we are really going all-out to tackle the litter in The Green. We are entering the well-publicised *Keep Britain Tidy - Great British Spring Clean* campaign and have produced exclusive badges with our slogan **Keep the Green Clean** and will be giving them to all our Litter Heroes.

Men's Shed in Acocks Green?

Some of you with an eye on social media may have heard about the possibility of a new Shed in Acocks Green. You'd be forgiven for wondering what all the fuss is about. Someone putting up a new shed - is that really worth getting excited about?



This isn't any old Shed. Several people in Acocks Green have been itching to set up a community Shed at Fox Hollies Forum for some time to join the other 400+ community sheds dotted around the country. Also known as 'Men's Sheds', these initiatives have been popping up everywhere and we think it's about time Acocks Green had one too.

The original idea of the Shed movement was to reach out to older men who might be feeling lonely or isolated for a whole host of reasons such as being at a loose end after retirement or suffering the emotional consequences of separation or bereavement. Sheds are about social connections and friendship building, making and mending, sharing skills and knowledge, and of course a lot of laughter. It is widely acknowledged that men are often not as keen as women to reach out and tend not to talk with others in times of need. You will often hear it said in the Shed movement that women communicate *face to face*, whereas men will talk *shoulder to shoulder*. The community Shed was therefore seen as a way of dealing with this challenge. This certainly doesn't mean that women are not welcome! In many of the sheds up and down the country, women are encouraged to join. The emphasis nevertheless is on maintaining a focus on those who the Shed is meant to be helping.
